

DYSINGER REUNION.

The third annual reunion of the Dysingers was held on the lawn at the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Ernest in Royalton on Aug. 14.

There were 152 members of the family in attendance. They ranged in age from babes to three score years and ten. One octogenarian was present.

Dinner was served at 1 o'clock, when all joined in singing the Doxology.

The president, Franklin Dysinger, called the assemblage to order and a business meeting was held. Rev. Mr. Allatt offered prayer. 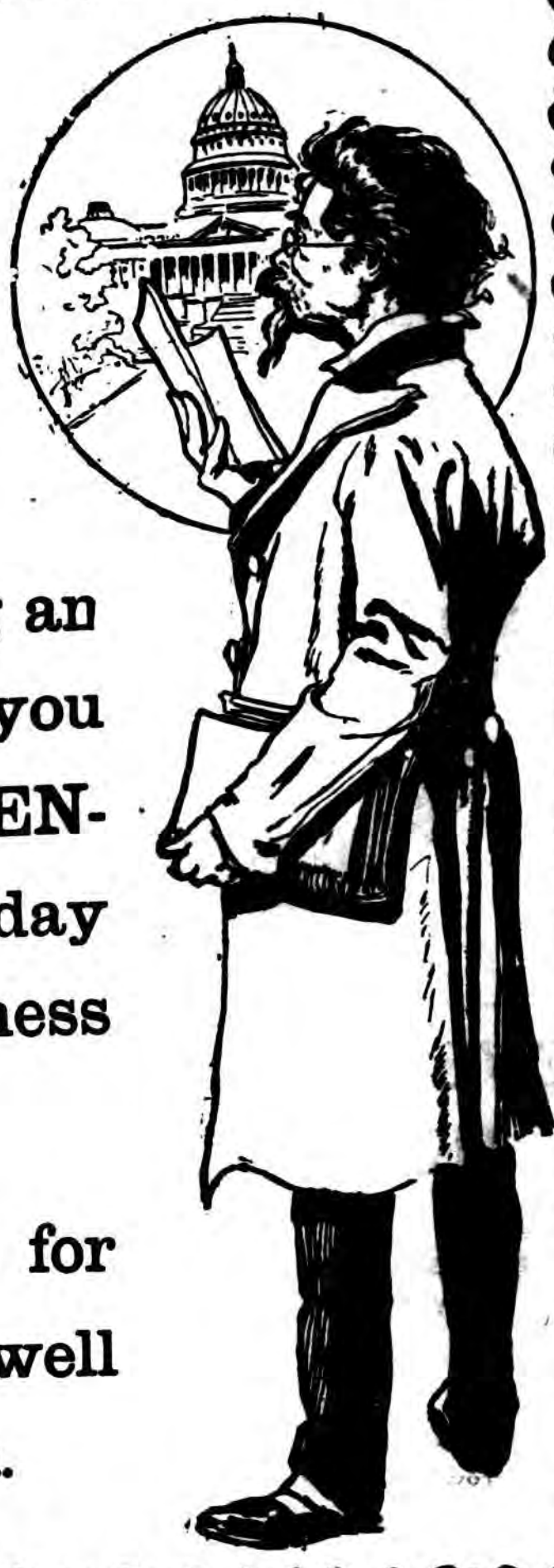

LAWS OF NEW YORK—By Authority [Every law, unless a different time shall be prescribed therein, shall not take effect until the twentieth day after it shall have become a law. Section 43, article II, chapter 8, General Laws.]

Chap. 416.

AN ACT to authorize the city of Lockport to borrow money, by the issue of bonds, to establish a sanitary heating, ventilating and closet system in, and to make needed repairs to, Washburn street school building.

Accepted by the city. Became a law, May 7, 1903, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The city of Lockport, by its common council, shall have authority, and when requested so to do by the board of education of said city, it shall be its duty, to cause registered or coupon bonds of said city to be issued in the name and upon the faith and credit of said city, which said bonds shall be sealed by the city seal, and signed by the mayor and city clerk, in a sum not exceeding five thousand dollars, bearing annual interest at a rate not exceeding four per centum per annum. The principal of said bonds shall be payable in five equal, successive, annual installments from the date thereof, at the office of the city treasurer, or at some bank within the city.

Sec. 2. Upon the issue of said bonds, the city treasurer of the city of Lockport shall suitably advertise for proposals for the purchase of the same, and he shall sell them to the party or parties offering to pay the highest price therefor, but at not less than their par value. The said treasurer shall keep in his office a record of all bonds sold hereunder, by number, date, amount and name of payees, subject at all reasonable times to the inspection of the mayor and common council, or any taxpayer of the school district hereinafter mentioned. The proceeds arising from such sale shall be, by said city treasurer, forthwith paid over to the treasurer of the board of education of said city of Lockport. Said board of education shall have the power, and it shall be their duty, to require their said treasurer to execute an additional bond, in form similar to his present official bond, in a sum and with sureties approved by said board, for the faithful holding, paying and accounting for such moneys.

Sec. 3. The moneys so realized from the sale of said bonds issued shall be used and applied by and under the direction of said board of education, for furnishing, erecting and installing a sanitary system of heating, ventilating and closets in, and making other needed repairs to, the Washburn street school building, in primary school district number three of said city.

Sec. 4. The common council of the city of Lockport is hereby authorized to, and shall include in the annual tax levy of said city, in addition to other sums now or which may then be authorized to be raised therein in any one year, the amount necessary to pay said bonds and the interest thereon, as the same shall become due as above provided, the same to be levied and collected of all the taxable property, real and personal, in primary school district number three of said city. The amount so levied for the payment of said bonds and interest shall not be applied to or be used for any other purpose whatever.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

Chap. 458.

AN ACT to authorize the electors of the town of Newfane, Niagara county, to vote upon the local option questions specified in section sixteen of the liquor tax law as restricted to the limits of the hamlet commonly known as Olcott situated in said town.

Became a law, May 7, 1903, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Sec. 1. For the purposes of this act, the state commissioner of excise is empowered and directed to establish a limit or boundary line around the unincorporated hamlet commonly known as Olcott, situated in the town of Newfane, Niagara county, in the manner provided in subdivision seven of section eleven of the liquor tax law. For the purpose of determining whether the traffic in liquor may be carried on within the limits of said hamlet in any manner specified in section sixteen of the liquor tax law, the local option questions, specified in said section of said act, may be submitted to the qualified electors of the town of Newfane at a special town meeting to be held at any time within sixty days next after this act shall take effect. The town clerk of said town shall, not less than twenty nor more than thirty days after this act shall take effect, without any petition therefor, call such special town meeting and shall cause to be printed, posted and published notices thereof and of the submission of such local option questions, in accordance with the provisions of said liquor tax law. It is further provided that such notices shall describe the boundary lines established around said hamlet. As soon as such special town meeting shall be held, a return of the votes cast and counted shall be made as provided by law and a certified copy of the statement of the result of the vote upon each of such questions submitted shall immediately be filed by the town clerk with the state commissioner of excise and also with the county treasurer of Niagara county, and no liquor tax certificate shall thereafter be issued to any corporation, association, copartnership or person to traffic in liquor in that portion of the town of Newfane within the limits of said hamlet, except in accordance with the result of the vote upon such questions submitted as the same shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of section sixteen of the liquor tax law. Such vote shall take effect immediately, but shall neither authorize nor preclude the issuance of liquor tax certificates for the traffic in liquors in said town of Newfane not included within the limits of said hamlet, but shall remain in full force and effect, without regard to the result of the vote upon the local option questions submitted at the next biennial town meeting in said town, and until the second regular submission of such questions to the electors of said town shall be had and the result thereof take effect. The traffic in liquors in said hamlet, except as prescribed in this

act, is subject to all the provisions of the liquor tax law.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

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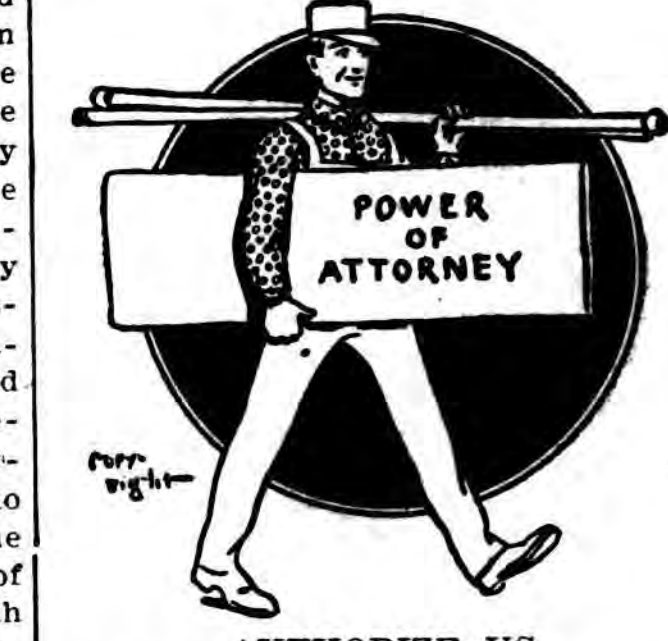
