ACTIONS AGAINST CITY.

Two Cases Which will Probably Reach Trial in Supreme Court This Week.

FIVE O'CLOCK.

The damage suit of Minnie Munzel vs. the City of Lockport is on the day calendar in Supreme Court and will probably be brought to trial to ay or Wednesday. The plaintiff resides in Hartland.

On January 31, 1899, she came to this city in a Democrat wagon. While driving up Market Street the wagon struck a depression in the road and the woman was thrown out of the rig backwards. It is alleged that she sustained severe injuries as a result of the fall. She wants \$5,000 from the city, alleging that the city was negligent in not keeping the road in better repair. She has retained S. Wallace Dempsey. The city's interests are being looked after by City Attorney Vicary.

Another case quite similar to the Munzel action is that of Mrs. Mary Schobey vs. the City of Lockport. Mrs. Schobey was injured on July 14, 1899. on Main Street. She, too, fell from a carriage. She was driving on Main Street, it appears, when her horse ran away. The street was being repaired and a pile of debris had been piled in the road directly in the path of the frightened horse. The wheels of the carriage struck the debris and the woman was thrown to the pavement. Several bones were broken. Mrs. Schobey thinks \$10,000 would just about square her account against the city.
