## HOPES RISE HIGHER.

Conviction of Recovery Puts Doubts to Flight.

### DAY OF NATIONAL THANKSGIVING.

Be Assured Are Those Near the President of His Quick Return to Health That Arrangements Are Being Made for a Day of Rejoicing.

**BUFFALO, Sept. 10.**—The following official bulletin was issued at 9:30: The President's condition this morning is eminently satisfactory to his physicians. If no complications arise a rapid convalescence may be expected. Pulse 118; temperature 99.8; respiration 26.

**BUFFALO, Sept. 10.**—The following bulletin was issued by the President's physicians at 5:20 a. m.: "The President has passed the most comfortable night since the attempt on his life. Pulse 104; temperature 100.4; respiration 28."

**BUFFALO, Sept. 10.**—"The President has passed the most comfortable night since the attempt on his life." Such was the joyful information gleaned from the first official bulletin of the morning. The feeling of encouragement over the condition of the President, which grew stronger yesterday as the hours sped by, has given way to confidence and elation. Physicians and others coming from the sick chamber at the Milburn house, say that there is now but very little doubt that the President will recover. So sanguine is the belief, that President Milburn has given permission to announce that there will be another President's Day at the Pan-American Exposition. It will be an occasion for thanksgiving for the recovery of President McKinley, and were there doubts of this, Director General Buchanan announces that the day would not be planned. A system of electric signals is to be arranged, so that, at a given signal, bells will be set ringing, whistles blowing and cannons booming all over the United States. The physicians are being quoted definitely as expressing confidence in the President's recovery. Although they will not have it understood that the danger is entirely passed, they declare that unless unlooked for complications develop he will certainly be restored to health.

At 10 a. m. Dr. McBurney came out of the Milburn residence. He said: "There is very remote possibility of peritonitis. He should be in very good shape in from two to three weeks. There is generally about three weeks in such a case as this. The President will be abusing his attendants in a few days for not allowing him to get up."

Dr. Park, who is at the patient's bedside almost constantly, says that the period for the development of peritonitis has about passed.

While the bullet in the President's back has not been extracted, Dr. Rixey, the President's private physician, says there is no immediate reason for worry.

"The presumption is, says Dr. Rixey," that it is lodged somewhere in the muscles of the back.

Pursuing natural courses, it would now be encrusted and cut off from possibility of evil. There will be no attempt to extract the bullet at the present time, although the X-ray machines are in the house, and all the instruments necessary to an operation are ready. The President is doing well and in my opinion will recover."

The weather, which has been very much in the President's favor, took an unfavorable turn this morning. A drizzling rain set in early and warm weather is promised.

The cool wave has been a potent factor in the President's improvement and is considered providential.

Th conditions have been in contrast to those attending President Garfield, who was shot much earlier in the summer, and in Washington where the weather is much hotter than here.

## NOT A CLUE TO IDENTITY.

Nothing Was Found in President's Clothing Which Would Have Identified Him.

**BUFFALO, Sept. 10.**—In the clothing of the President returned from the Emergency Hospital were the following articles: \$1.30 in coin; a silver nugget pocket-piece; three small pocket knives; one battered coin; a wallet containing \$45 in notes; a silver shell lead pencil; three short cigars, not the kind he smokes, two of them slightly chewed; an open face gold watch and a gold watch chain and not a clue to his identity.

## NO ANARCHISTS HERE.

Lockport Contains a Few Socialists But Are Not to be Confounded With Reds.

Are there any Anarchists in Niagara County? This question was asked of Chief of Police Molyneux by a reporter for the Journal.

"I don't know. I am sure, however, that there are no Anarchists in Lockport. I have never heard of there being any in this city," was the reply.

There are several followers of the red flag in the Tonawandas. There are Socialists in Lockport, and many persons get these two societies confused in their minds. There is absolutely no connection between the two, however.

No steps have been taken as yet to arrest the North Tonawanda anarchists. They are few in number and it is said that they have no regular meeting places in that city. They are to be found in the lower class of foreign laborers.

The North Tonawanda News calls upon the good citizens of the Lumber City to stamp out the evil at once.

Chief of Police Ryan of North Tonawanda is in the city. He came down from the Lumber City this morning to appear before the Grand Jury in the case of the People vs. Harkness, the young man from Tonawanda who is in jail on a charge of highway robbery.

When asked if it were true that there are Anarchists in North Tonawanda, Chief Ryan said: "Oh, we have a few of them up there."

"What are you going to do with them, Chief?" the Journal man asked. "I am waiting for instructions. It is quite probable that they may be arrested."

"Did the Anarchists ever hold any meetings in North Tonawanda?" "I believe they held a few outings last summer."

Chief Ryan says that the followers of the red flag in his city are composed mostly of Poles, but that there are some Germans among them.

Shortly after President McKinley was shot, an Anarchist in the Lumber City declared in a public place that he was glad of it; that it was too bad that he had not been killed outright. A person who overheard the remark stepped up to the scoundrel and knocked him down. The blow was a heavy one, for the fellow did not arise immediately. When he finally got up he went to Police Headquarters and asked for a warrant for the arrest of his assailant. Chief Ryan, after hearing the man's story, ordered him to skedaddle at once or he might be tempted to punish him more severely than he had been punished by the man who had felt justified in knocking him down. Catharine Rood vs. the City of Niagara Falls, is the title of an action that is on the day calendar in Supreme Court. This is an action for \$10,000 for personal injuries alleged to have been sustained by the plaintiff by falling on a defective walk in the City of Niagara Falls in March last year. The plaintiff alleges negligence on the part of the city. Dudley, Gray and Highland for the plaintiff; Franklin J. Mackenna for the defendant city.

Thomas Conroy vs. the Holly Manufacturing Company was first case on the day calendar in Supreme Court today. The plaintiff sues for \$10,000 for alleged damages sustained by him as a result of alleged negligence on the part of the defendant. About four years ago, it appears, Conroy was employed at the Holly works. A piece of rabbit struck him in the eye and injured him. He claims to have been badly hurt and wants the company to settle. The case has not been called yet.

Case No. 61, Benjamin F. Schad vs. Grant Perry, et al., is on the day calendar and will probably be reached late this afternoon. This is a rather complicated action arising out of an accommodation note transaction. It is alleged that Grant Perry asked a Mr. Townsend to endorse a note, which was subsequently given to Charles Schad of Lockport, who turned it over to his son, the plaintiff. The note came due and was not paid. Schad sued Perry and Townsend, the maker and endorser, but the suit is directed principally against Mr. Townsend, as it is said he is the only one in the party that is responsible. He alleges that he was induced to endorse the note by false representation on the part of Perry.

## PREPARING FOR TRIAL

Extraordinary Term of Supreme Court May Be Convened.

### GOVERNOR ODELL WILL CALL IT.

Arrangements for the Coming Trial of Anarchist Czolgosz on the Charge of Attempting to Murder the President Are Being Talked of—Assassin Is Sane.

It is said that an extraordinary session of the Grand Jury of Erie County is to be called by Governor Odell to indict Czolgosz for attempted murder. Supreme Court Justice Childs is to be designated to preside at the trial. Ten years in States prison is the full penalty for conviction. It is further stated that President McKinley is not to be summoned as a witness for the prosecution, as there are sufficient witnesses to declare Czolgosz's guilt.

Up to this time the assassin has no counsel, and the court may have to assign some one to defend him.

In his talk with Secretary Root, the Governor, it is said, discussed the advisability of sending to the legislature, at the next session, a recommendation that a law be enacted, making it treason to attempt the life of the chief magistrate, the penalty to be same as the conviction for treason, death. Although no decision was reached as to this, it is likely to be strongly urged when the Governor returns to Buffalo.

## IN THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Grigg Brothers May Not Build Except of Fireproof Material—Other Business.

Grigg Brothers will not be permitted by the city to build a frame addition to their mill on Race Street. At the meeting of the Common Council last night the petition of that firm was killed by the Mayor.

Grigg Brothers wanted to enlarge their flour mill, as has been told in the Journal. The plant is within the fire limits, and in order to build a frame structure at their plant they would have to get the Council to pass a special ordinance granting to them a special privilege. The Mayor, after thoroughly investigating the matter, came to the conclusion that it would not be wise to grant the ordinance and announced that he would not approve of any grant by the Council. The petitioners have hauled the materials to their plant and were ready to go ahead with the construction. They were certain that the desired ordinance would be passed.

Arthur J. McDonald and John B. Gathard were appointed special police by the Common Council.

The Mayor reported the appointment of 104 candidates who qualified for the positions of election officers.

A petition to construct a sewer on Irving Street was read and referred to the Committee on Sewers. Alderman Hurst, at this point in the proceedings, became involved with several of his colleagues in a discussion on the merits of the petition, and one of the Aldermen threatened to eject him from the Council Chamber. The Alderman in question declared that Hurst was a blank, blank mule. Alderman Hurst's reply was equally vigorous and the men clinched. No blows were struck, however, and the contest was called a draw.

The Council designated the polling places for the coming elections. They are the same as heretofore.

Residents of Gooding Street between Monroe and Eighteen Mile Creek reported to the Council that the electric cars refuse to stop on signal in their locality. The railway company was ordered to discontinue this practice.

Emma Goldman Was Taken in Chicago This Morning.

### WILL BE HELD FOR COMPLICITY.
