Another sad death has cast a gloom over this community. The circumstances under which it occurred make it peculiarly sad. About three weeks ago Miss Sarah Hause was married to Arthur T. Baker. On the day of the wedding or the day following she was taken sick with typho malarial fever. She was not considered in a dangerous condition either by her physician, Dr. L. C. Davis of Vassar, or her family, until within a few hours of her death, on Friday last, when she sank rapidly. Her sudden and untimely death is a crushing blow to her young husband and her parents, and they have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community. Her remains were taken to Memphis, the former home of the family, as Mr. H. intends returning there in the spring. Rev. S. Gilchrease accompanied the mourners and officiated.

CARLISLE JACKSON, a little two-years-old son of Mr. Wm. Jackson, named in honor of Ex-Speaker Carlisle, died yesterday at 1 o'clock p. m., of convulsions. The funeral services will occur tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence.

Carlisle, the infant son of Wm. Jackson, freight agent of the O. and N. road, died of convulsions yesterday, aged 17 months.

Carlisle passed away November 27, 1885.

Mr. William Jackson, the well-known and popular depot agent of the O. & N. railroad company in this city, died of inflammation of the bowels at his home at Main and Crittenden street, this morning at 5.55 o'clock. Mr. Jackson was taken sick about two weeks ago, and although he was much improved a week ago, gradually grew worse from that time until he died. Mr. Jackson was 34 years of age and a native of Michigan. He began work in a railroad office when fifteen years of age. He was at different times connected with the Michigan Central, Canada Southern, O. & M., J., M. & I. and was in the service of the L. & N. for a number of years before his death. He had been stationed here about eight years and was regarded as one of the most efficient agents connected with the whole L. & N. system.

The remains will be interred at Elmwood cemetery. The time of the funeral has not yet been determined.

Death of Mr. Wm. Jackson.

Mr. Wm. Jackson, agent of the O. and N. railroad at this place, died yesterday morning at 6 o'clock, of inflammation of the stomach and bowels. He had been ill for two weeks, but until Saturday was not thought to be dangerously sick.

Mr. Jackson had had the local agency of the O. and N. for the past eight years and had always discharged his duties in the most faithful manner toward his employes and agreeably to the public, so that all who had dealings with his office or who knew him socially regarded him highly. He was a member of the Knights Templar and Knights of Pythias, and will be buried by these orders this afternoon at 3 o'clock at Elmwood. The funeral will occur from the Fourth-street Presbyterian church.

Death of William M. Jackson.

Mr. William M. Jackson, General Agent of the Louisville and Nashville railroad, at Owensboro, died there rather unexpectedly Tuesday morning, of inflammation of the stomach and bowels. He had been sick but a short while, and but little attention was paid his illness. A few days ago he began to improve, but Sunday the relapse came, and he continued to decline until his death.

Mr. Jackson was well known in railroad circles here, and by the L. and N. management was very highly regarded as an official. He has represented the company at Owensboro for over eight years, and in that time built up a very large traffic for the company. He was formerly with the Canada Southern, the O. and M., the J., M. and I., and was well known by railroad men all over the country.

Memphis, May 4 — Frank A. Hause, 84, long prominent in the public life of Riley Township and Memphis, died in his home here Thursday.

Mr. Hause was born in Memphis April 14, 1867, son of Laban and Melissa Hause. He married Della Raymond, who survives him, Feb. 18, 1888. They observed their sixty-third wedding anniversary last Feb. 18.

FOR MANY YEARS, Mr. Hause operated a general store in Riley Township, then with George Cottingham operated a general store in Memphis. In Riley Township he served as clerk and treasurer, in Memphis as Village President, clerk, trustee and assessor, also as a member of the Board of Education many years.
