appeared in open Court ~~before the Judge of the~~

of the Town of ~~Warren~~ <sup>Warren</sup> County of Herkimer  
State of New York <sup>Chas. Warren</sup> aged seventy six years  
of age who being first duly sworn according  
to Law declared on his oath ~~and~~  
and made the following declaration in  
order to obtain the benefit of the Act of  
Congress passed the seventh day of June  
1832 he made the following declaration  
that he entered the Service of the United  
States under the following named officers  
and served as ~~private~~ <sup>private</sup> of the State

Canajoharie

And this Dependant further saith  
that he was born in the Town of  
Canajoharie County of <sup>Troy</sup> ~~Warren~~ <sup>Troy</sup> now the  
Town of ~~Canajoharie~~ <sup>Danube</sup> County of Herkimer  
State of New York and that when he  
first entered the Service of the United States  
he resided in the Town of <sup>Canajoharie</sup> ~~Canajoharie~~ as  
aforesaid and County of Montgomery the aforesaid

This Dependant further saith that  
he does not recollect the year he first entered  
into the Service of the United States but says  
according to the best of his recollection that  
he entered in the Month of July under Capt  
John Hiram Sinton and Lawrence Goff

in the town now the town of ~~Phillips~~  
The Entertainment took place ~~in the town of Phillips~~  
by Sergeant Elias ~~for during the war~~  
further south that he ~~thinks~~ that the  
Entertainment took place shortly after the com-  
mencement of the war. Says he enlisted as a private  
Soldier. This deponent further says that  
that after being so enlisted as a private the  
deponent was ordered to go to Conyohansy  
and after arriving at that place saw paper  
muster and took the oath of allegiance that  
took place in the presence of my officers of the  
company to which I belonged to wit Capt John  
Winn Lieutenant Lawrence Grop and Second  
Lieutenant Shumling and after the comp-  
any being so organized we commenced  
our march proceeded to Springfield <sup>Orange</sup>  
county from thence to Cooperstown in said county  
remained there some time during which time  
I was sent out on scouts among the rest  
sent to Unadilla, <sup>German Flatts</sup> ~~German Flatts~~, says that  
on arriving at German Flatts we received a  
paper for us to carry to our officers in order  
to show that we were at that place on the  
aforesaid scouts

This deponent further says that  
some time in the winter of said year  
we left Cooperstown for the town of Springfield  
there we remained until the spring of the  
following year ~~thence~~ the company became  
ordered ~~thence~~ <sup>a place called</sup> from thence to Johns  
town from thence to Philadelphia Bush  
there we lay some time in going out on scouts  
~~from Philadelphia to rest to a place called~~  
I shall be as ~~happy~~ H. P. C.

known from those who were  
shown by some time in going out on boats  
for ~~the place to rest~~ ~~the place~~  
I have been ~~in the~~ ~~of the~~

at several different places to rest to look  
and go Lake George about forty miles, to  
Londy Hill, Sorotago &c. This deponent  
further states on arriving at Londy Hill  
of the said the company then present were  
ordered on parade and Sergeant Weiser  
disobeyed the order of Capt John Winn  
when said Capt gave said Weiser such  
a mortal blow with a musket which  
caused Weiser's death he surviving  
only few days. In consequence of the death  
of said Weiser ~~the~~ Capt John Winn  
flee and left his company and was  
pursued by a file of men and was  
taken on the Susquehanna River and  
brought back to Annapolis where this  
deponent stood guard over his body  
a number of days and until he the said  
Capt was taken to Albany where imprisoned  
in the Jail of that County. This took place  
some time in fall of said year and then  
this deponent quit the service the company  
being ~~so~~ much disorganized and scattered  
that they all quit it and this deponent pro-  
ceeded home. This deponent further says  
to the best of his recollection he served under  
said Capt John Winn Sergeant Lawrence  
Gross Second Lieutenant <sup>not left then</sup> ~~Shrimling~~ One  
year and five months this deponent  
further says that when he enlisted under  
said Capt John Winn he enlisted for during  
the war and that they enlisted as Rangers

and were known as a company of Rangers and that during our term of service we performed no other service than ranging and scouting from place to place until the company became disbanded as aforesaid

This deponent further saith that the year after the battle of <sup>Onp Kanig</sup> ~~Onp Kanig~~ early in the spring of said year he this deponent did in the service of the United States for the term of Nine Months under Capt Dickson of Cherry Valley then enlistment took place in the town of Springport ~~of~~ <sup>in</sup> Allegany County after my enlistment I proceeded to ~~at~~ <sup>at</sup> ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> ~~house~~ <sup>house</sup> of said Capt Dickson after arriving there we the company under the command of Capt Dickson <sup>and another company commanded by Capt Gray</sup> was ordered ~~to~~ <sup>to</sup> ~~take~~ <sup>take</sup> possession of a number of boats said to have been taken from Burgoyne something like twenty in number and we proceeded down the river north said boats to a place called Ferry Town there we remained some time in ferrying <sup>carrying</sup> soldiers across the river this was General Washingtons army which we ferried across the river ~~thence~~ <sup>thence</sup> in the morning from thence back to where there I remained on duty in boating up the river and back until the close of the year and on the evening before new year I received a written discharge by Capt Dickson which said discharge is since lost this includ my ~~own~~ <sup>own</sup> Nine Months term of enlistment

And this deponent further saith that he enlisted in the Service of the United States the Third time for the term of Nine Months being enlisted into the Company of Capt Samuel <sup>as a private Soldier</sup> Gray this Enlistment took place early in the ~~Spring~~ <sup>Spring</sup> of aforesaid succeeding year the year after above mentioned this deponent says cannot recollect the year this Enlistment took place but says he was Enlisted at or near Fort Mandeville now West Jersey County and after being so Enlisted I was ordered to go to Schenectady and on arriving there we were set a boating on the Mohawk River up and down said River and we continued that kind of business during the summer season under the command of Capt Samuel Gray Colonel Brown who was afterwards killed at <sup>near Stone Arabia</sup> Stony Brook nothing but soldiers discharged on this Enlistment thanks at Schenectady by Capt Samuel Gray then by a verbal discharge this Enlistment being Enlistment for nine Months

This deponent further saith that he enlisted the ~~first~~ <sup>second</sup> time early in the Spring of the following year cannot give the year when this Enlistment took place but says that this Enlistment was at some place along the Mohawk River at Cayuga for the term of Nine Months under Capt Lippin <sup>as a private Soldier</sup> Company and commenced my service at Schenectady and continued my service



his service in the war of Revolution not less than the periods mentioned below and

in the following grades to wit —  
For four years and ten months I served  
as a private Entitled Soldier and for  
such service I claim a pension

This Deponent further testifies that  
Eleven months out of the above estimate  
of Revolutionary Service was a prisoner  
of war among the Enemy Indians  
in Canada &c —

This Deponent further testifies  
that his Second third & fourth enlist-  
ment as above mentioned to wit  
under Capt Jackson Capt Samuel  
Gray & Capt Seftor was rendered in  
the war of the Revolution & exclusively  
in the Trading Service, the Service  
was rendered principally on the Mohawk  
River from the City of Schenectady to  
Fort <sup>Stenwick</sup> and places intermediate  
except my Second Enlistment above mentioned  
I was rendered in the Trading Service  
on the North River as before stated

This Deponent further testifies  
that my Service on the Mohawk, as a  
Boatman consisted in Carrying Military  
goods, stores, Ammunition, Arms & Equipage,  
Cannon, &c & from Schenectady to Fort  
Stenwick and other Forts Intermediate

This Deponent further testifies that  
his first Enlistment commenced soon  
after the commencement of the war of  
the Revolution and that he this  
Deponent enlisted into the United

State's Continental troops for during the  
war and the company to which he belong  
was known as a company of Rangers  
and not at present recollect whether such  
company was attached to <sup>any</sup> Regiment or  
not. Said Company's business seemed  
to be to Range thro' the Country and  
go on secret from place to place  
in this company I served one year and  
five months. ~~Said Company he~~  
~~came disbanded. This deposition further~~  
~~test that he does not recollect as name~~  
~~of any person living by whom this~~  
~~deposition was taken. Capt. John Thomas can~~

This deposition further saith  
that the several Companies commanded by  
Capt Jackson Capt Samuel Gray, Capt Lefler &  
Capt Cross of our mentioned colors under the  
Associate command of Colonel Willst

This deposition further saith that he  
was born in the new Town of Danube York  
County State of New York does not recol-  
ect the year precisely but believes ~~to have~~  
~~been~~ born in July 1757. Says  
that he has no record of his age &  
Says that he Resided in the new Town of  
Danube York County State of New York  
when he first Enlisted in the Service of the  
United States in the war of Revolution and  
since the war he Resided in the aforemen-  
tioned Town from thence to the Town of Stark  
York County from thence to the Town of Spring

Herkimer County from thence to the Town of Spring

field at Steegs County New York from thence  
to Warren my present place of Residence  
Herkimer County -

This deponent further says that he  
participated in the war of the Revolution as a  
private Soldier says had not never been  
Accepted neither a Volunteer nor a Substitute

This deponent further says that the  
Regular officers who were with the troops  
where I served were Colonel Millet Colonel  
Brown Capt John Wain Capt Decker Capt  
Samuel Gray Capt Sifer Capt Lawrence  
Gray - said Gray was Lieutenant under said  
John Wain Lieutenant Shrumling General  
Herkimer Colonel Coy Major Fink

This deponent further says that he  
had got but one written discharge that was  
from Capt Decker which is lost and all  
other discharges were Verbal

This deponent further says that  
the following persons are to me personally  
known and reside in my immediate  
neighborhood who can testify to my char-  
acter and their belief of my services  
as a Soldier in the war of the Revolution  
to wit Peter Billinger Jackson Van Volken  
burgh Henry Hauser John Dupler &c

This deponent further says that  
he never received any Annuity or Pension  
from Government or under any Law of the  
United States providing for the officers and  
Soldiers of the Revolution hereby Relinquish

Every claim to a pension or annuity  
except the present passport June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832  
and declares that any name is not  
on any pension roll of the agency of any  
State

This deponent further says that he  
has not obtained the evidence of a clergy neither  
has there any clergy now living of this  
deponent's knowledge who testify to this  
deponent age

This deponent further says that he  
has no documentary evidence showing  
any of the services of this deponent in  
the war of the Revolution

Dear Madam:

The data given herein are shown in the papers on file in pension claim, S. 19340, based upon service of George House in the Revolutionary War. It is the record of the only soldier of New York with name George House, under any spelling of that surname, found on the Revolutionary War records of this office.

George House was born in July 1757, in Canajoharie, Tryon County (later Dambe, Herkimer County), New York; the names of his parents are not shown.

While residing in the town of his nativity, he was enlisted in the summer, year not stated, by sergeant Elias House and served as private in Captain John Winn's company, of New York rangers engaged in northern New York, and continued more than one year. No relationship between said Elias House and George House was stated. From sometime in the spring of 1778, he served on different tours in each succeeding year in the boat service, once at Tarrytown and at other times on the Mohawk River, under Captains Dickson, Samuel Gray and Leffler, Colonel Brown's New York regiment. He enlisted in February 1781, as private in Captain Laurence Gray's company, Colonel Marinus Willett's New York regiment, crossed the Mohawk River to secure supplies and was taken prisoner by the Indians, was carried to Canada and held prisoner for more than one year, then made his escape and returned home.

George House resided some time after his service in Dambe, Herkimer County, New York, then moved to Stark in that county, thence to Springfield, Otsego County, and from there to Warren, Herkimer County, New York.

George House was allowed pension on his application executed February 11, 1833, at which time he resided in Warren, Herkimer County, New York.

No reference was made to wife or children of George House.

In 1833, Christian House of Stark, Herkimer County, New York, and Henry House of Springfield, Otsego County, New York, stated that they were acquainted with George House at the time he served in the Revolutionary War, but did not state any relationship between them.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, name and address of person paid, and, possibly, the date of death of George House, you should apply to The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, this city, and cite the following:
